IL H.B.4269	This bill mandates that from January 1, 2030, all new washing machines sold or offered for sale in Illinois must include a microfiber filtration system with a mesh size no greater than 100 micrometers and must have a clearly visible label informing consumers of this feature. Additionally, it specifies penalties for failing to file toxic chemical release forms in a timely manner, with a daily penalty accruing after a certain period, and addresses penalties for actions causing the death of fish or aquatic life, with funds recovered going to the Wildlife and Fish Fund. Civil penalties are payable to the Environmental Protection Trust Fund or, in some cases, partially to local governments, and are intended to support environmental protection efforts. The bill ensures penalties are at least as great as the economic benefits gained from the violation, unless such a penalty would cause unreasonable financial hardship, and allows for penalties to be offset by supplemental environmental projects. IL H.B.4627	The legislation amends the PFAS Reduction Act to authorize the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) to engage in an interstate clearinghouse aimed at promoting safer chemicals in consumer products. The EPA is directed to establish a data collection interface in collaboration with the clearinghouse, which manufacturers of PFAS or products containing intentionally added PFAS must use to register their products and provide detailed information, including product names, types, universal product codes, purposes of PFAS use, and quantities sold or imported into the state. IL H.B.4639	The legislation establishes the Small Single-Use Plastic Bottle Act, which aims to reduce the use of small single-use plastic bottles containing personal care products in hotels. If PFAS contaminants are detected at levels exceeding 20 nanograms per liter, the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency (IEPA) will require the system operators to notify all users about the detected PFAS concentration and the potential health risks until the levels fall below the specified threshold. IL H.B.4752	The legislation amends the Environmental Protection Act to address the replacement of lead service lines in Illinois. It allows the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency (IEPA) to grant community water supplies an initial extension of the lead service line replacement timeline for up to 30% of the original timeline, an increase from the previous 20%. The Act mandates that community water supplies develop and maintain a comprehensive inventory of water service line materials and a lead service line replacement plan. IL H.B.4808	The legislation amends the Environmental Protection Act, specifically Section 19.4, to mandate that the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency (IEPA) adopt rules for administering the Water Revolving Fund that promote regionalization and proactive compliance. IL H.B.4831	The proposed legislation establishes the Small Single-Use Plastic Act, which aims to reduce the use of small, single-use plastic bottles containing personal care products in hotels. The Act defines key terms such as "hotel," "personal care products," and "small, single-use plastic bottle." Starting July 1, 2025, hotels with 50 rooms or more are prohibited from providing these plastic bottles in guest rooms or shared bathrooms. This prohibition extends to all hotels beginning January 1, 2026. However, hotels may still provide these products upon request at locations other than guest rooms or shared bathrooms.	IL Rep. IL H.B.5033	The proposed legislation amends the Metropolitan Water Reclamation District Act to introduce several new administrative roles and departments within the District. Specifically, it allows the executive director, with the advice and consent of the board of commissioners, to appoint a director of diversity, equity, inclusion, and justice, and to create a corresponding department. Additionally, the executive director may appoint a deputy executive director, who must be selected based on administrative and technical qualifications without regard to political affiliations and will serve under the direct supervision of the executive director. The bill also makes conforming changes to ensure these new roles are integrated into the existing structure of the District. The deputy executive director and the director of diversity, equity, inclusion, and justice, along with other key positions, are excluded from the classified civil service, meaning they are not subject to the same employment protections and processes as other civil service employees. The legislation outlines that these roles, along with other high-level positions, can be removed for cause by the executive director, who must provide a public hearing before removal. IL H.B.5042	The legislation amends the PFAS Reduction Act to introduce new requirements and restrictions aimed at reducing the presence of intentionally added perfluoroalkyl and polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS) in various products sold or distributed in Illinois. By January 1, 2026, manufacturers of products containing intentionally added PFAS must submit detailed information to the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), including product descriptions, the purpose of PFAS use, and the amount of each PFAS chemical. The EPA may waive or extend these requirements under certain conditions. Starting January 1, 2025, the sale of specific products containing intentionally added PFAS, such as carpets, cleaning products, cookware, cosmetics, and food packaging, will be prohibited.	IL Rep. IL H.B.5421	HB5421 Engrossed amends the Rivers, Lakes, and Streams Act, specifically Section 14a, to mandate close cooperation among the Pollution Control Board, the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), and the Department of Natural Resources for the preservation and utilization of Lake Michigan's waters. The legislation requires the EPA to monitor Lake Michigan's water quality, including nearshores, harbors, and public water supply intakes, and to provide a biennial executive summary on the water quality conditions to the Governor and the General Assembly. Additionally, it authorizes these agencies to directly engage with individuals, municipalities, corporations, and other entities that may contribute to pollution in Lake Michigan. IL H.B.5424	The proposed legislation amends the Illinois Income Tax Act to introduce a new income tax credit specifically for fire equipment distributors who are engaged in the research and development of alternative fire prevention equipment that does not contain perfluoroalkyl or polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS). The tax credit is set at 75% of the expenditures incurred during the taxable year for the development of such equipment. This credit is available for taxable years starting on or after January 1, 2025, and ending before January 1, 2035. The total amount of credits awarded in any taxable year is capped at \$5,000,000. Additionally, the credit cannot reduce a taxpayer's liability to less than zero; any excess credit can be carried forward for up to five subsequent taxable years. The legislation also defines key terms such as "fire equipment distributor" and "fire prevention equipment" and specifies that the Office of the State Fire Marshal will oversee the credit application process.
